Satan basically said, "<u>IF</u> you are the Son of God, why don't you prove it? You're powerful, correct? And <u>IF</u> Scripture is true, then you will be saved by angels... What's the big deal? Satan was using the temptation of pride ("You say you are the Son of God, why don't you prove it?") to cause Jesus to sin against His Father. God loves His Son more than we can ever hope to comprehend (at least while we are alive in this world). And God loves us the same, because we are adopted sons and daughters! However, sin is the barrier between human beings and the Holy and pure and perfect Lord God Almighty. God gave us Christ Jesus,

who is the bridge that enables us to pass over that barrier of sin to Him... the bridge is the Lord Christ Jesus and our belief in Him, His death, and His resurrection.

It is just a tiny, little thing that I ask from you in return." Satan was using the temptation of lust to cause Jesus to sin against His Father. Can you imagine the wisdom and power Jesus had at His 'fingertips'? In His breath? The first chapter of John's Gospel begins, "In the beginning was the Word [Jesus] and the Word [Jesus] was with God and the Word [Jesus] was God. ² He was with God in the beginning. ³ Through Him all things were made".

There are three basic temptations: selfishness, pride, and lust. Jesus resisted each one! The way Satan presented those temptations to our Lord was more enticing than anything we might experience or that we can even imagine. Jesus knew His Scripture and He used passages from Deuteronomy to reject Satan's temptations.

Fortunately, God has given us these examples to use, plus the entirety of the Old and New Testaments. There is power in Scripture to repudiate the devil when we too are tempted.

Don't squelch your conscience — if the thought is Scriptural, it is God guiding you toward the 'door' that He has provided to you as your "way out". Take it. Don't hesitate.]



Jesus Begins His Ministry

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¹³ Leaving Nazareth, he went and lived in Capernaum [Kŭh-pĕr-nŭm], which was by the lake in the area of Zebulun [Zĕb-yoū-lŭn] and Naphtali [Năf-tă-læ] — ¹⁴ to fulfill what was said through the prophet Isaiah: ¹⁵ "Land of Zebulun and land of Naphtali, the way to the sea, along the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles — ¹⁶ the people living in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of the shadow of death a light has dawned. [Isaiah 9:1-2]"

Commentators have provided us Bible students with an incredible wealth of scholarly insights and educated opinions regarding these verses. A person could develop a single study that exclusively examined these four verses and all that is implied.

Commenting on Isaiah 9:1: "[In] Isaiah [chapter] 8, Isaiah has been describing the gloom of anguish and thick darkness that will fall upon those who reject God's Word (Isaiah 8:20–22). No relief of morning's light will come for them.

"Now [in chapter 9], Isaiah speaks of a time to come, when that despair and darkness will lift. The anguish will end in Israel. Specially, he is speaking of the northern region of Israel that once belonged to the tribes of Zebulun and Naphtali. That area was the first to be hit by the destructive power of the Assyrians as they swept through the land. The area around the Sea of Galilee was taken by Tiglath-Pileser, king of Assyria, around 733 BC. The Assyrian king repopulated it with Gentile settlers from other lands.

"Assyrian records from that time show that this conquered, occupied region was divided into three Assyrian districts. Isaiah mentions those same three districts in this passage. [1] 'Galilee of the Gentiles' was also known as the Megiddo province: from the Litani River in the north to the Valley of Jezreel. [2] 'The way of the sea' is the Dor province: along the Mediterranean from Joppa to Haifa. And [3] 'along the Jordan' or 'beyond the Jordan' is Gilead: territories east of the Jordan River from the Dead Sea to the Sea of Galilee.

"Isaiah speaks, though, of a time to come when this region will be made glorious once more. The darkness will be dispelled. The light will return in splendor in the form of a child who will become much more than just a king. He will be the Messiah." [© Copyright 2002-2025 Got Questions Ministries, accessed 12/11/2025. All rights reserved. https://www.bibleref.com/Isaiah/9/Isaiah-9-1.html]

Commenting on Isaiah 9:2: "This famous verse [Isaiah 9:2] describes that future reversal. Isaiah speaks of these events in the past tense, although they will not take place until Jesus arrives on earth as the Messiah. The people of Israel who suffer under ignorance, unhappiness, and insecurity will be given a hopeful sign. That is like "light" shining into a dark place. It will be made obvious in the New Testament that the light is none other than Jesus the Messiah. Those living in Israel at the time will see Him cutting through the darkness with their own eyes.

"Jesus will teach that even then, before He fully establishes His kingdom, not everyone will receive the light. Some will still choose darkness: 'And this is the judgment: the light has come into the world, and people loved the darkness rather than the light because their works were evil. For everyone who does wicked things hates the light and does not come to the light, lest his works should be exposed. But whoever does what is true comes to the light, so that it may be clearly seen that his works have been carried out in God' (John 3:19–21)." This kingdom is also at hand to us; and wherever Christ crucified is preached, there is salvation to be found. Jesus is proclaimed to thee, O man! as infinitely able and willing to save. The commentator Albert Barnes wrote:

"The phrases kingdom of heaven, kingdom of Christ, kingdom of God, are of frequent occurrence in the Bible. They all refer to the same thing. The expectation of such a kingdom was taken from the Old Testament, and especially from Daniel, <u>Daniel 7:13-14</u>. The prophets had told of a successor to David that should sit on his throne <u>1 Kings 2:4</u>; <u>1 Kings 8:25</u>; <u>Jeremiah 33:17</u>. The Jews expected a great national deliverer. They supposed that when the Messiah should appear, all the dead would be raised; that the judgment would take place; and that the enemies of the Jews would be destroyed, and that they themselves would be advanced to great national dignity and honor.

"The language in which they were accustomed to describe this event was retained by our Saviour and his apostles. Yet they early attempted to correct the common notions respecting his reign. This was one design, doubtless, of John in preaching repentance. Instead of summoning them to military exercises, and collecting an army, which would have been in accordance with the expectations of the nation, he called them to a change of life; to the doctrine of repentance - a state of things far more accordant with the approach of a kingdom of purity."
